Math Olympiads 2024

This year, 67 Springdalites took part in the Singapore and Asian Schools Math Olympiad (SASMO), Asia-Pacific Mathematical Olympiad for Primary Schools (APMOPS) and National Mathematical Olympiad of Singapore (NMOS). These competitions aim to generate greater interest in Mathematics among primary school pupils and sharpen their problem-solving skills.

This year, we achieved 2 Gold Medals, 4 Silver Medals and 11 Bronze Medals for SASMO; 2 Bronze Medals for APMOPS; and 3 Silver Medals and 2 Bronze Medals for NMOS. Congratulations to all our winners and participants who put in tremendous effort to prepare for these competitions.

Springdale Primary School celebrated Racial Harmony Day with vibrant activities that highlighted Singapore's multicultural heritage.



Our Springdalites worked hard to prepare for the competition with a few rounds of rehearsal and performed commendably during the Audition Round at Science Centre on 5 July.




